Emergency Management & Engagement (EMERGE) Track

These training courses provide Tribal Nations with vital skills to enhance safety, preparedness, and resilience across their communities. Participants learn site protection through vigilant observation and situational awareness to prevent terrorist attacks, and master effective response strategies for active shooter incidents. Collaborative crisis management training strengthens partnerships between law enforcement, first responders, and schools, improving incident planning and recovery. Community Planning for Disaster Recovery equips Tribal Nations to develop effective post-disaster strategies, while Strengthening Community Resilience courses offer frameworks and resources to address current challenges, reduce vulnerabilities, and build long-term resilience within tribal communities.

**Crisis Management for School-Based Incidents – Partnering Rural Law Enforcement, First Responders, and Local School Systems**

Explore collaborative strategies for school crisis management. Learn incident planning, threat identification, response protocols, and recovery processes. Strengthening partnerships between law enforcement, first responders, and schools to improve preparedness and post-incident recovery.

**Surviving an Active Shooter: Run. Hide. Fight.**

Understand the importance of an effective response to active shooter incidents. Master the Run. Hide. Fight. principles, integrate them into emergency action plans, and apply them in various active threat situations to improve personal and organizational safety.

**Site Protection through Observational Techniques**

Learn how vigilant observation and situational awareness can help prevent terrorist attacks. Identify suspicious behaviors and activities, select appropriate response actions, and apply observational techniques to real-world scenarios to enhance site protection.

**Community Planning for Disaster Recovery**

Discover essential concepts of disaster recovery and planning. Identify the roles of community partners, evaluate sample recovery plans, and learn steps to create effective post-disaster recovery strategies.

**Strengthening Community Resilience within Tribal Nations**

Examine current challenges facing Tribal Nations and explore frameworks, methods, and resources to enhance community resilience. Identify long-term actions to reduce vulnerabilities and strengthen tribal communities.

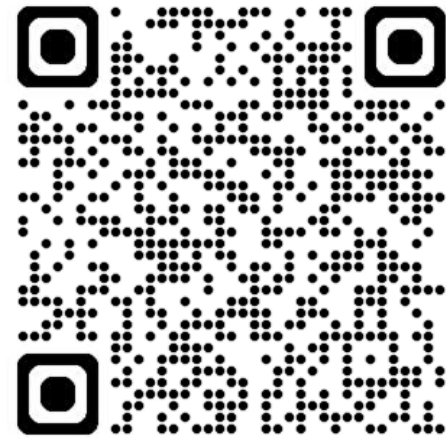
